Dear Secretary Vilsack,

On behalf of Oregon Wild and our thousands of members and supporters, we are writing to express our alarm at your statement today supporting a Colorado plan that puts roadless wildlands in that state, and around the country, at great risk. Attached please find a letter signed by Oregon Wild and over 100 conservation groups encouraging unambiguous and consistent action from the Forest Service in line with your administration's commitment to uphold the strong, popular, common sense protections of the 2001 Roadless Rule.

We have been heartened with your public commitment to protect roadless wildlands in Oregon, the Pacific Northwest, and across the country. We were encouraged by your May 28, 2009 directive and when you defended the popular and balanced 2001 Roadless Rule in the 10th Circuit Court of Appeals earlier this year.

However, we remain extremely concerned about other actions taken by your agency that have sent mixed messages.

We were troubled by your October 16, 2009 roadless redelegation memo which enabled Forest Service Supervisors to push through roadless projects without your review so long as they *asserted* compliance with the national rule (even if the facts suggested otherwise). We are concerned about the continued insistence to prolong a Bush-initiated exception for the roadless protections in the Tongass National Forest. We took note when you encouraged Oxbow Mining Company and Arch Coal to expand their operations into roadless areas in Colorado.

Such actions send mixed signals to Forest Service personnel. It has enabled those who are hostile to the protections of the Roadless Rule to forge ahead with destructive, and controversial roadless projects. Examples in Oregon alone include the DBug Timber Sale, The Blue Mountain Forest Plan, the Mt. Ashland Ski Area Expansion, and more. DBug and The Blue Mountain Forest Plan have been explicitly justified on the grounds of uncertainty over national roadless protections.

Today we were particularly concerned with your support for a Colorado plan (also the culmination of a process initiated by the Bush administration) that is a giveaway to development interests like coal companies, removes national protections from 4.4 million acres of roadless National Forests, and opens them to destructive development. Doing so undermines the popular and common sense protections of the 2001 Roadless Rule that your administration promised to defend and uphold.

We are extremely concerned and deeply disappointed by these recent actions. We hope future actions will be unambiguously consistent with your administration's pledge to defend and uphold the 2001 Roadless Rule and protect our pristine roadless wildlands for the benefit of all. In doing so, we look forward to working constructively with you to achieve that commendable and mutual goal.

Dear Secretary Vilsack:

We want to thank you for your strong and public commitment to uphold the 2001 Roadless Area Conservation Rule against court challenges from its opponents. With the Ninth Circuit Court of Appeals on record in support of the rule, we are pleased that the Obama administration is currently defending it in the Tenth Circuit Court of Appeals, where it has been challenged by the mining industry, among others.

However, we are concerned that even while the Obama administration is defending the rule in the Tenth Circuit, it has taken several actions in states such as Alaska, Colorado and Oregon that would appear to contradict this position. In particular, we are troubled by the administration's recent decision to allow Oxbow Mining Company and Arch Coal to begin the regulatory process to expand their operations into inventoried roadless areas (IRAs) in Colorado. Both corporations have vigorously opposed the rule since its inception and have been aggressive in seeking to circumvent its protections through an alternative proposal the state is advancing.

Given the Obama administration's strong support for roadless protection, we ask that you and the Forest Service not approve any activities in conjunction with the Oxbow and Arch Coal mine expansions that would violate the 2001 rule. In this spirit, we also ask that you commit that no future road construction will occur in Colorado IRAs to facilitate the expansion of these mines or any development of other industrial scale projects, including those that involve logging, mining, and drilling.

The 2001 Roadless Area Conservation Rule is the product of more than three decades of exhaustive public debate, years of scientific review and a federal rulemaking in which a record number of Americans participated. With more than half of our National Forests already open to logging, mining and drilling, the rule was intended as a balanced approach to preserve the last third of undeveloped forestland as habitat for wildlife, a haven for recreation, a source of clean drinking water, and a heritage for future generations.

When it comes to America's forests, the Obama administration has a tremendous opportunity to continue the stewardship legacy of President Theodore Roosevelt and ensure these wild landscapes are preserved for future generations. We thank you again for your commitment to the Roadless Area Conservation Rule and we look forward to working together to make certain that all 58.6 million acres of our last wild national forests benefit from this landmark policy's full protection.
